



History in the Making in Historic Harrison Township

Did you know?

- People have been living in present-day Harrison Township for over 10,000 years.
- Harrison Township originally included South Harrison and the western edge of Elk.
- The township is named after President William Henry Harrison.
- There is a village called Mullica Hill in Finland.
- The first air shipment of fresh produce in the US took off from here.

Since its founding in 1971 the Harrison Township Historical Society has presented exhibitions, events, programs and publications focusing on the heritage of South Jersey in Mullica Hill's Old Town Hall, built in 1871.

The Stone Age in Harrison Township and Living Off the Land: Food, Farms and Families, explore the region's Paleo-Indian heritage and our local foodway and farming traditions, while the Raccoon Valley General Store and Harrison Academy Schoolroom recreate two rural institutions.

We also present seasonally changing special exhibitions, student programs and unique special events like the annual Groundhog Day Dinner (featuring local sausage - "ground" hog!) and the popular Mullica Hill Ghost Walk in October. Richwood Academy Cultural Center



Richwood's historic schoolhouse has served as an educational and community center for 150 years.

The Academy was built in 1870 and continued to function as Richwood's public school until 1950. A group of the school's alumni purchased the property in 1951 to preserve the building and provide Richwood with a community meeting place.

Today the Academy has resumed its role as an educational institution. Here the Society presents public programs, performances and lectures in the intimate setting of its historic first floor classroom.
