

# **NEW EXHIBITION** Back to the Fif lies

On Sunday, March 26, the Society opens a new exhibition exploring the era of rock and roll, the Cold War, Civil Rights and mid-century advancements as reflected in Harrison, South Harrison and Elk Townships.

The post-World War 2 period presaged the changes and growth that were to take place over the next 60 years.

While farming continued to dominate the local economy, more residents, many new to the community, were working outside of the township. New arrivals stimulated a need for housing and several of the larger residences in Mullica Hill were converted into apartments. Farmers began selling off lots with road frontage for new homes, all of which stimulated the need for new schools. The decade was bracketed by new school construction in 1950 and 1960. New meeting halls built by Ewan Fire Company, the newly formed American Legion Post and Mullica Hill Grange provided new spaces for social gatherings, and the old schoolhouse in

## **Asparagus Festival Returns** SATURDAY, MAY 13, 10 - 3


On the morning of May 17, 1922, a Fokker airplane loaded with 1,000 pounds of Gloucester County asparagus flew from Mullica Hill to Boston. History was made that day, for this was the first time fresh produce was shipped by air in the United States and it all started right here.

101 years later the Harrison Township Historical Society commemorates this event and celebrates Spring at Old Town Hall with food and fun. This year the Festival features a "Battle of the Chefs" tasting contest, as blueplate, Marino's of Mullica Hill and Dave's 322 BBQ vie for Best Asparagus Chef of 2023. In addition, there are special exhibits, a town-wide scavenger hunt, activities for children, 50/50 raffle, and a vintage cookbook sale. Also, the 2023 Festival T-shirt will be available for purchase.

# **Remembering Dr. Irene Hill-Smith**

Mullica Hill's Dr. Irene Hill-Smith was Gloucester County's foremost civil rights activist. She served as president of the Gloucester County and New Jersey NAACP and rose to become the Association's national vice president from 1967 to 1979. Always at the civil rights forefront, she worked with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and was one of the community leaders called by President Lyndon Johnson to help craft the landmark 1964 Civil Rights Act.

A panel of family members gathered at the Academy on March 5th to share memories about her life and her accomplishments with a full house. HTHS Board member Robert Greene organized and moderated the event. The program remains available online at the Society's Facebook page. Sincere thanks are due to Mr. Greene and the panel participants for an enjoyable and insightful program.

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Richwood - today's Richwood Academy Cultural Center - was repurposed as a community hall. All were indications of more dramatic changes that were to come.

Back to the Fifties reflects back on this moment in time to examine life in our community from the late 1940s to the early 1960s. The exhibition features a variety of artifacts and photography from the Society's collection, many of which are being shown for the first time. Richwood Academy, built in 1870, was the oldest building still in use and housed kindergarten classes. In contrast, the new school was a state-of-the-art facility. The new kindergarten room featured indoor and outdoor play areas and indoor plumbing, a far cry from the Academy. The students didn't just move into a new building; they left the 19th century behind.


## HARRISON TOWNSHIP SCHOOL STUDENTS RETURN TO OLD TOWN HALL MUSEUM

# Society Acquires Child's Rocking Chair made by Mullica Hill Chairmaker, John Dubois

Museums routinely take inventory of their collections and occasionally objects come to light that do not fit within their subject focus. Such artifacts frequently were accepted before clearly defined guidelines for what should and should not be collected had been formalized or were included within a larger donation. Such was the case about 20 years ago when the Society received a collection of 19th century photographs in which there were several dated stereocards identified as a small village in Pennsylvania. As they were not pertinent to Old Harrison Township, we offered to the county historical society where the town was located. Upon receipt, that society informed us that what we had sent were images of a town that was destroyed by devastating flood. These were the only photos taken before the catastrophe - a rare and welcome find for which they were very grateful.

In January the Salem County Historical Society sent us a photo of a paint-decorated child's rocking chair that they suspected was made by the Mullica Hill chairmaker, John Dubois. We immediately recognized that the attribution was correct and was similar to other examples in our collection. Assured that it was



not relevant to their collecting focus, the Society authorized that it be donated to us. We might note that we have transferred archival material relevant to Salem County to them as well over the past several years.

John Dubois lived on High Street where he appears to have had his chairmaking shop. His house still stands on the corner of High and Eric Road, moved there from its original location across the street where Friends School is now. Dubois made traditional South Jersey rush-bottom ladderback chairs. Like the better known Ware family chairs of Salem and Cumberland Counties, Dubois chairs have maple frames and three-corner rush seats, but tend to be more generously proportioned. As is typical of Delaware Valley ladderbacks, the slats are graduated in width from top to bottom with the largest at the top where the greatest strength is required. Simple ring turnings appear on the front legs only between the stretcher and the seat. The front stretcher has a simple center turning that can vary from chair to chair. Rockers are attached to the sides in the same manner as the Wares. He also stuffed the seats with rush to create a thick cushion. What makes his chairs especially distinctive, however, is the use of paint. Dubois was a house painter as well as chairmaker and all the known examples of his work show that they were originally painted, including the rush seats.

Dubois' chairs for children, however, represent his most original work. Unlike his chairs for adults, these pieces take their inspiration from fancy arrowback armchairs of the 1840s The paint decoration consists of striping and abstract flowers and leaves, and are appropriately more playful than the decoration on adult chairs. The example from the Salem County Historical Society exemplifies Dubois design aesthetic and retains what appears to be an early, if not original seat, although it is not painted.

It is curious that the announcement of Dubois' death made no mention of his work as a chairmaker, noting instead that he was "a painter by trade." Census records indicate that between 1860 and 1870, Dubois' principal occupation was no longer chairmaking, even though he apparently continued to make and sell chairs.

We are grateful for the Salem County Historical Society's donation, which complements our holdings of work by Mullica Hill's most prominent - and last - chairmaker.
